ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 2001-2002

We take pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for the year 2001 – 2002.

During the year Amar Seva Sangam conducted one major fund raising programme at Courtallam – Visu's Arattai Arangam . Telecast in four episodes, this feature was well received by the viewers. Following the telecast, a stream of visitors thronged the Sangam and hailed the good work of the Institution. Donations also have started pouring in.

Another landmark achieved during year saw the addition of a building known as IOB Block to the Sivasaraswathy Nursery School. As the name suggests, the block was fully funded by Indian Overseas Bank and inaugurated by their Executive Director Mr.R.Natarajan on 16-2-2002.

The year under report proved to be a drought year. The rain was scanty which awakened us to conserve water by providing many rain water harvesting facilities to improve the underground water table

Management information system is the need of the hour. Thanks to M/s.Rashmi Info Media, Chennai, we have developed a very good MIS, the fruits of which will show up in the years to come.

1. Rehabilitation Services

1.1. Home / Daycare¹

The Home for the physically challenged had strength of 48 students as on 31st March 2002. There was only one day scholar. The Home had staff strength of 13 including the Home Warden. The Home has a kitchen, a prayer-cum-dinning hall. The Home is also used to give physiotherapy to the residents. Physiotherapy includes.

2. Educational Services

The strength in the Integrated School⁵ has increased to 688 from 641 some last year. The number of Disabled students in the school is 47 this year down from 49 last year. The Disabled students strength In Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU)⁶ has also gone down from 3 students last year to 12 students this year. The total number of students however in IGNOU has improved from 47 to 88.

3. Vocational Training Services

The handicraft-making center has shown tremendous growth last year and has trained more number of Disabled persons than last year.

4. Empowerment

About 50 SHG¹³ were formed of PWDs during the year. The composition of the PWDs reflects the importance that should be given for employment generation and for development of skills. The field activities have started showing results as people

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are now coming out to talk about their problems and acceptance levels have increased both among the parents and the PWDs about the disabilities and their responsibilities in the rehabilitation process. There has also been increased willingness among the other sectors of the society to absorb the PWDs in the day-to-day part of the life.

5. Advocacy

One of the important developments during the year was the active interest shown by the Central Govt. in the implementation of National Trust Act for the Mentally Retarded persons and for Multiple Disabled persons. Recognized training for Caregivers, formation of Parent's Association and District level committee have already being started in several parts of the country. Amar Seva Sangam on its part is in the process of forming Parent's Association. This has opened the doors for many of the parents of such disabled children / adults who need support.

Another important development in the national scene was the adoption of Barriers Free Architecture by the Central Public Works Department, which is implementing the guidelines in the Central Govt. buildings. The Chief Commissioner for the Persons With Disabilities conducted a series of workshops in one of which I was also a participant to bring awareness and educate the Architects, Engineers, NGOs and Govt. departments about the technicalities involved in Barriers Free Environment.

a. Railway Coach Designing

Efforts were taken to meet the authorities in the integral coach factory at Chennai. The first the meeting was held in May 1999 and the need for designing a separate coach for physically challenged persons, was discussed. As a follow up during April 2001, another meeting was held at Chennai. A new design was by then made ready and one model was also kept at the technology exhibition held at Chennai in June 2001. A manufactured coach was visited by the secretary and the project manager of the Sangam along with the State Commissioner for PWD's (Person with Disabilities) and the president of the State Handicapped Association in April –2002. The Sangam recommended several improvements

which were now incorporated in the coach vide their letter No. MD/DSS/EMU/DC/167 dated 31-07-2002. The Sangam is also now approaching on Southern Railway Authorities for a special coach to be attached in the express Trains. Now one specially designed coach for PWD's (Person with Disabilities) is attached in the guard van in some of the express trains.

There is still no special quota for reservation for the physically challenged persons. Middle and Upper berths are often given for such persons. The Sangam is in the process of a dialogue with the railway authorities to reserve three percent of the lower berths exclusively for the physically challenged persons and also make available the specially designed express coach for severely disabled persons and make them available in the computerized reservation system.

b. Special Wheel Chairs.

The Secretary of the Sangam is working with private manufacturers for designing compact pushchairs, which can be used in narrow passageways of bus and Railway coaches. Designing is also being initiated for a battery operated wheel chair at affordable price for Indian Conditions and multipurpose wheel chairs are also being designed.

c. District Plan for Physically challenged

The Sangam was involved in formulating District Level action plan during April this year. The plans have been drafted in consultation with the Collector of the District and with the State Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities along with the District Disability Rehabilitation Officer.

6. Human Resource Development

a. Training Programme for PR Section at Bangalore

The PR section staff attended a training programme at Bangalore in January this year on report writing and a preparation of publicity materials

b. Self Development Programme

Shri Harihara Mahadevan and Shri. Narayanaswamy conducted courses on individual development for staff.

c. Training Programme with Mathuram Narayan Trust

Mathuram Narayan Trust conducted early identification techniques of childhood disabilities for our rehabilitation staff. Dr.Jayachandran of Chennai also piloted the course.

d. Art of Living basic course

YOGA classes conducted by the particular School of training were conducted for the staff and students with disabilities at the Sangam during the year.

e. English conversational course by Ramanarayanan, Kadalur

Shri K.J.Ramanarayanan of Cuddalore conducted training classes on conversational English during the year for our teachers and staff.

f. Dyslexia introduction course by Sadana Trust, Madurai

Training for identifying children with learning disabilities and handling them was offered to the teachers and the rehabilitation workers of the Sangam during May 2002.

g. Training on Mental illness

Training on Mental illness for identifying people with such problems and for dealing with their psychological aspects were given for the rehabilitation workers at M/s.Chellamuthu Trust, Madurai. It is to be noted that mental illness is also consider being a disability under the Persons with Disability's Act.

h. Training on folklore as a medium for creating awareness among the masses in the rural areas.

Training on folklore dances, music and drama as a street play to create awareness on disability issues were imparted as a continuing education process

for the field level rehabilitation staff. Mr.Manimaran and Ms.Flora of ADD India, Trichy gave trainings.

7. NGO Net Working


Networking helps in sharing of resources and creates a common platform for presenting the problems before the public. It creates a forum for wider level representations and helps in building common protocols and standardization. The Sangam has already become a partner in CBR Forum-Network, ADD India and a partner with Vidhyasagar. Amar Seva Sangam hosted a two-day workshop of the District Office bearers meeting of Tamilnadu Association for the Welfare of Physically handicapped at Ayikudi in March this year. About 25 delegates of the Association participated in the programme. The State Commissioner for Disabilities also participated in the second day of the workshop.

8. Finances

1.1 Amar Seva Sangam's corpus has risen to Rs.2,90,16,851.81 from Rs.2,29,39,537.61 last year including the SRTT corpus. The total assets of the Sangam have gone up from Rs.3,64,23,501.72 to Rs. 4,47,15,499.92 this year. The income and expenditure for the year 2001-2002 are as follows:
